Disposal Sites will be closed Thursday, December 25 and January 1st. Mackey and Stonecliffe Collection will occur on Wednesday, December

Recycling Collection will occur as usual on December 22 and January 5, 2015.

The Garbage Collection between December 23rd and January 10th will be Amnesty Days where more than the usual one bag of garbage will be collected roadside. For these dates, two untagged bags of normal household garbage will be allowed. Rules as to unacceptable materials and sorting of recyclables will be enforced. It is also important to remember that Council sets policy and direction for the Municipality and that Municipal staff are the people who are responsible for the day to day operation of the Municipality.

I want to take this opportunity to wish you all a very merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year and I look forward to serving you for the next four years.

of our councilors on being acclaimed to Council. Although you did not have the opportunity to participate in an election, you are rightly justified in occupying the position of Councillor. By filing your name, you are no less deserving of a seat on Council than if you had successfully faced an election.

Thank you for taking such an interest in serving our Community.

I want to outline to Council and staff what I think our Community expects of us as a Council and what I, as the leader of this Council, expect us to deliver. These expectations are based on my 14 years of experience on Council, on the training I have received over those years, on what I learned from residents and non residents during my election campaign, on various codes of conduct, and others are based simply on good manners. Some of you have had training and experience that describes a number of these expectations that you already perform, but I feel it important to repeat them here so that we are all starting off the next four years

on the same page.

We, as a Council, are expected to:

- Arrange for receipt of our Councilor packages.
- Be prepared for meetings by doing our homework and our own research if necessary.
- ★ Show up at every meeting on time.
- Notify staff immediately if we are unable to attend a meeting or will be unavoidably late and, failing that, notify the Reeve or another member of Council. This should be done promptly by phone and email if possible.
- Notify staff of any long term absences from the Community. (more than a week)
- ★ Ensure we are dealing in facts only.
- ★ Fully participate in debate on all major issues.
- ★ Immediately correct any statements that are not factual.
- In a split vote, indicate why we are taking our position.
- ★ Support Council decisions once they are made.
- Be open, frank, polite, and truthful in all our discussions with ourselves, with staff and with the public.
- ★ Use our staff as a source of factual information.
- Do what is best for the long term interests of our Community and that includes the silent majority.
- * When engaging in discussions with the public, ensure they are aware of policies and procedures and are dealing in facts.
- Be respectful of each other, the public, and staff.
- ★ Ensure the lines between Council's duties and staff's duties do no not become blurred.

- ★ Be respectful of delegations to Council.
- ★ Promptly return phone calls and emails.
- * Support and attend Community events when possible.
- ★ Participate in training relative to our positions.

Our adherence to these expectations will help ensure that we, as a Council, will manage the affairs of this Municipality in a manner that our residents can be satisfied is best for our mutual long term interests.

come January, the Disposal Site Hours will be Reduced once again - for January, February and March ONLY the disposal site hours will be as follows. Bissett - Tuesdays - 12:30 - 2:00 p.m. and Stonecliffe - Thursdays - 12:45 - 2:30 p.m. Saturday hours remain the same.



SNOW ON MUNICIPAL ROADS

Annual snowplow operations begin with the first significant snowfall of the year. This can be as early as November 15 (our contract start date) or as late as Mother Nature decides. Township bylaws and the Highway Traffic Act prohibit parking or stopping on a road in a way that interferes with plowing operations. Plow operators need clear roadways to complete their routes safely and on time. Under the Highway Traffic Act, residents are prohibited from deposit-

ing snow on any roadway. When clearing snow, pile it on your property – do not shovel it onto the road or across the road into the ditch. This practice is dangerous because it may cover the salt/sand applied and may cause drivers to lose control. It may also cause windrows of snow that freeze across the road causing further hazards.



TRAILER PARKING FOR SLEDDERS

As determined in 2013, Municipal staff allow for parking of vehicles and trailers along municipal roads at certain locations along Mackey Creek and Ashport Roads. The snowplow turnarounds are already plowed as widely as possible in these areas for this purpose, vehicles parking there are not ticketed provided they park where indicated.

So long as people park their vehicles along the left side of the road, the left side while traveling in the road (the south side of Mackey Creek Road and the north side of Ashport Road) they are OK. They will not be ticketed, towed or plowed in.

Be respectful of others and municipal operations. Ride Safe.


